Living with his parents and siblings in the high mountains of Kabyle, Koukou is an empathic, artistic spirit, unapologetically himself andhelpful with the women, and this behavior and outlook are perceived as threatening by male village elders. With Koukou's father's agreementthey commit him to a mental asylum. When his brother Mahmoud returns from the city and finds out, he leads a fight to convince everyone of Koukou's innocence.
